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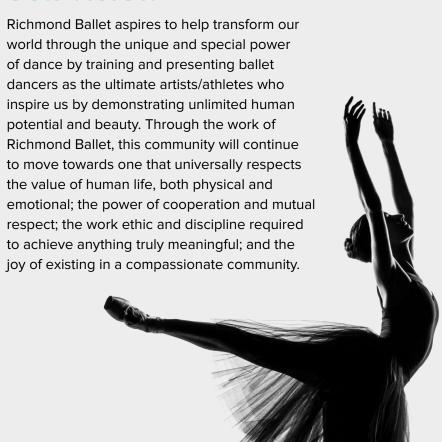
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OUR MISSION

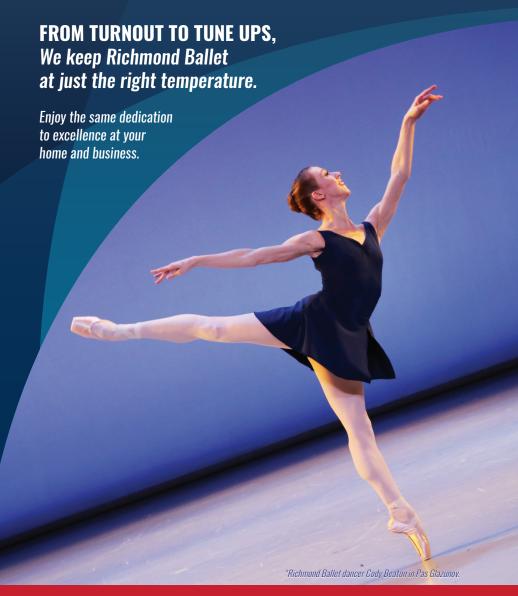

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RICHMOND BALLET | ARTISTIC DIRECTOR



Stoner Winslett is the founding Artistic Director of the Richmond Ballet professional company. Her unique, strong partnership with the community has built a fine civic organization into an important national dance force through working toward a clear and shared vision. In the 41 years under Ms. Winslett's direction, Richmond Ballet has established the first major company of professional dancers in the Commonwealth of Virginia, commissioned nearly

75 original works from over 35 choreographers from around the world, introduced the much-acclaimed *Minds In Motion* program into Virginia schools and now Israel, and renovated and occupied its landmark downtown building on Canal Street. She led the Company through its New York debut at The Joyce Theater in 2005, with return productions in 2008, 2010, and most recently in May 2017, and directed its international debut in London in 2012, in a highly acclaimed run at the Royal Opera House's Linbury Theatre. The Company conducted its first tour to China in May of 2015, with performances at the National Centre for the Performing Arts in Beijing and the Shanghai Grand Theatre.

Ms. Winslett received her early training from Ann Brodie, Aldofina Suarez, and Michael Lland in Columbia, South Carolina, and later trained at the American Ballet Theatre School and the North Carolina School of the Arts on scholarship. After knee injuries curtailed her performing career, she pursued a course of independent study at Smith College, where she graduated summa cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa. In 2005, she was awarded the Smith Medal, which is the highest honor the College can confer on an alumna.

Ms. Winslett's vision for the organization has always encompassed not only performing but also the training of artists and the education of the community, which are necessary to both preserve the heritage and explore new directions for the Company. Richmond Ballet reaches over 100,000 people annually across the *(continued on next page)*

Commonwealth and beyond, and boasts an impressive repertory with a foundation of full-length classics and 20th-century masters (George Balanchine, John Butler, Agnes de Mille, Jose Limón, and Anthony Tudor, among others), coupled with a strong commitment to new works, nine of which are are Ms. Winslett's own choreography and include her highly acclaimed version of *The Nutcracker*. The Ballet's scope also includes a school, the School of Richmond Ballet, which opened its dance studios 46 years ago and now serves more than 900 students annually; and many outreach programs featuring the unique *Minds In Motion* program now in its 26th year. The organization operates from a state-of-the-art training and performance center on Canal Street, developed in 2000 under the direction of Ms. Winslett and the Ballet's Board.

Ms. Winslett is one of the longest tenured artistic directors of a major ballet company and one of the few female artistic directors in the United States. She has received countless awards and recognitions at local, state, and national levels, and remains an active leader in the country's performing arts community that includes serving as a former Vice Chair of Dance/USA, as the President of the John Butler Foundation, and a U.S. delegate to the 2014 U.S.-China Consultation on People-to-People Exchange in Beijing. Recognized as a leader in diversity and inclusion in the ballet field, in 2017 Ms. Winslett was part of a small group of artistic directors invited by Dance Theatre of Harlem to begin discussions addressing these issues throughout the field. This two-day exchange of ideas launched The Equity Project, a 3-year cohort led by Dance Theatre of Harlem, International Association of Blacks in Dance, and Dance/USA and funded by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. Although sessions with this alliance of 21 ballet companies including The State Ballet of Virginia concluded January 2020, the promotion of equitable representation throughout the ballet industry remains ever-present at the heart of Richmond Ballet. Despite these many distinctions, Ms. Winslett often states that her highest honor has been the privilege to work with the talented professionals and dedicated community members who have made a real difference in the world by building Richmond Ballet.

RICHMOND BALLET | ASSOCIATE ARTISTIC DIRECTOR



Ma Cong was named Richmond Ballet's Associate Artistic Director in June 2020. He has been widely recognized by the dance world as a bold, bright, and inspired choreographer. Critics have described his choreography as being powerful and passionate. Having started his dance career at the Beijing Dance Academy, where he trained in the art of Chinese classical dance, he danced with The National Ballet of China from 1995 until 1999, prior

to joining Tulsa Ballet. As a choreographer, Ma was described by The Washington Post as "Powerful" and Houston's En Pointe as having "swiftly risen to become one of America's most exciting choreographers." Ma has created many original works for companies worldwide. His first creation for Richmond Ballet Ershter Vals was performed for sold out audiences at the Royal Opera House in London in 2012 and at The Kennedy Center in 2015. Also in 2015, Ma's creation Lift the Fallen was included in Richmond Ballet's Road to China program for its five-city tour through China. His New York City balletic premiere was in 2017 when Richmond Ballet performed his Lift the Fallen at The Joyce Theater. Among his many personal and professional achievements, Ma was named one of the "25 to Watch" by Dance Magazine in 2006 for his dancing and choreography works as well as The Choo-San Goh award in 2007. In 2008, Ma was the winner of the 21st Century Choreographic competition and also received the "Audience Favourite" and "Editor's Choice Award" from *Pointe Magazine*. In 2013, Ma was named as one of Joffrey Ballet's "Choreographers of Color Award" winners. Ma made his Broadway debut in 2017 while working with Julie Taymor on the revival of David Henry Hwang's Tony Award-winning play M. Butterfly, starring Clive Owen. In 2018 Ma's Glass Figures premiered at The Joyce Theater in New York and received rave reviews from audiences and critics alike. His most recent world premiere, a full-length creation for Tulsa Ballet, Tchaikovsky - The Man Behind the Music, has been celebrated as one of his greatest achievements as an artist and storyteller.

RICHMOND BALLET | MANAGING DIRECTOR



Brett Bonda, is now in his 36th season with Richmond Ballet, having served the organization as a dancer, administrator, educator, and director. A dancer with the professional company from 1985-1995, Mr. Bonda performed much of the company's repertory, dancing lead roles in ballets such as *Rodeo* and *Coppélia*, and appearing in the premiere of Stoner Winslett's original work, *Ancient Airs and Dances*. After learning of the

outreach work done through Lori Klinger and the National Dance Institute, Mr. Bonda elected to retire from the stage to become the Education and Minds In Motion Director for Richmond Ballet, Mr. Bonda served as the program's artistic and administrative coordinator for 16 years. Additionally, Mr. Bonda has served as the Ballet's Company Manager, Tour Manager, and video producer, before stepping into his current role as Managing Director, where he has worked closely with members of the Ballet's Board to oversee the organization's strategic planning and governance, and to initiate the Road To China project in 2014. Mr. Bonda's work with Richmond Ballet has been recognized both statewide and nationally: he has served as a panelist for the National Endowment for the Arts and as a juror for the Coming Up Taller Awards, and he is a board member for Virginians for the Arts. In 2001, Mr. Bonda received Richmond Magazine's Theresa Pollak Award for Excellence in the Arts and, in the summer of 2014, he represented the United States at the U.S.-China Consultation on People-to-People Exchange in Beijing alongside U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry and Richmond Ballet Artistic Director Stoner Winslett. Mr. Bonda is an alumnus of Virginia Intermont College.



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RICHMOND BALLET | COMPANY ARTISTIC TEAM

Malcolm Burn (Artistic Associate and Ballet Master), a New Zealand native, is in his 34th year with Richmond Ballet. During his 25-year dancing career, he performed in companies such as London Festival Ballet, The Royal New Zealand Ballet, The National Ballet of Zimbabwe, Ballet West, and P.A.C.T. Ballet in South Africa where he won the Ivan Soloman Award for Best Male Dancer in 1973, 1976, and 1980. A Richmond Ballet company dancer from 1987 to 1993, Mr. Burn remains fondly remembered for his principal roles in full-length ballets, for the memorable works created on him, and especially for his riveting portrayal of "Death" in The Green Table. He became a Company ballet master upon retirement from dancing with Richmond Ballet and was named an Artistic Associate in 1999. As ballet master, Mr. Burn has re-staged many of the classic full-length ballets and choreographed his own versions of Romeo & Juliet and Cinderella, as well as other shorter pieces including Pas Glazunov and A Tribute. Prior to coming to Richmond Ballet, Mr. Burn was co-director of Ballet Arizona. He is also currently a répétiteur for The John Butler Foundation

Judy Jacob (Artistic Associate and School Director) is from Detroit, where she studied ballet with Evelyn Smith. She trained in London, England, with Anne Heaton, John Field, and Valerie Taylor, and at Butler University (B.A.) and Indiana University (M.S.) with George Verdak, William Glenn, Peggy Dorsey, Anton Dolin, and Kenneth Melville. After graduation, Ms. Jacob danced professionally with Memphis Ballet, performing principal roles such as the Sugar Plum Fairy (The Nutcracker), Swanhilda (Coppélia), and the title role in Cinderella. She also created roles in ballets by choreographers Ron Cunningham, Jill Eathorne Bahr, Norbert Vesak, Robert Kelley, and Philip Jerry. Ms. Jacob was the Associate Artistic Director of Fort Wayne Ballet prior to joining Richmond Ballet in 1995. She was Assistant Ballet Master of the Richmond Ballet professional company for two years and became Director of the School of Richmond Ballet in 1998.

Jerri Kumery (Ballet Master)

began her studies with Roman Jasinski and Moscelyn Larkin in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and later studied at the *(continued on next page)*

School of American Ballet. In 1977, she was invited to dance with New York City Ballet under the direction of George Balanchine and Jerome Robbins. Ms. Kumery has served as répétiteur for Ballet Teatro Lírico Nacional and Pacific Northwest Ballet, and from 1990-2007 was Ballet Master/Associate Artistic Director of North Carolina Dance Theatre under the direction of Salvatore Aiello. Ms. Kumery was awarded an Arts & Science Council Fellowship for her meritorious contribution to the artistic community in Charlotte, North Carolina, She is the curator of The Salvatore Aiello Trust and serves as a répétiteur with The George Balanchine Trust.

Igor Antonov (Richmond Ballet II Director and Ballet Master) was born in Zaporozie, Ukraine.
Upon graduation from the Kiev Choreographic Institute, he joined the Donetsk Ballet (Ukraine) as a soloist. In 1990, he was invited to join Richmond Ballet, where for five seasons he danced leading roles in works by George Balanchine, John Butler, Antony Tudor, William Soleau, Malcolm Burn, and Stoner Winslett. During that time, he was also a medalist and best couple

award winner at the International Ballet Competition in Jackson, Mississippi. For the next several years, he danced with Deutsche Oper am Rhein in Dusseldorf, Germany, and made guest appearances with major ballet companies in Berlin, Madrid, and Nice. In 2003, he returned to Richmond Ballet, and while continuing to perform with the Company, he began conducting rehearsals and teaching at the School of Richmond Ballet, After his retirement from the stage. Mr. Antonov stepped into the role of leading Richmond Ballet's second company, Richmond Ballet II.

Erin Freeman (Resident Conductor)

serves in multiple capacities throughout the Commonwealth of Virginia and maintains a national presence through Guest Conducting engagements. Freeman holds a joint position as Director of the award-winning Richmond Symphony Chorus and Director of Choral Activities at Virginia Commonwealth University. Additionally, she is the Artistic Director of Wintergreen Music and Resident Conductor of the Richmond Ballet. Guest conducting engagements include the Buffalo

Philharmonic Orchestra, the Neglia Ballet, South Carolina Philharmonic, Savannah Symphony, Charlottesville Symphony Orchestra, Virginia Symphony Orchestra, and additional ensembles in Massachusetts. Maryland, Virginia, Georgia, Missouri, North Carolina, and Illinois. In recent seasons, Freeman made her debut at Symphony Hall in Boston with Berkshire Choral International, conducted multiple engagements with the Richmond Symphony and Richmond Ballet, premiered with the Portland (Maine) Symphony, and led an

international ensemble of singers and the Orchestre Symphonique Bel'Arte at La Madeleine in Paris. During the pandemic, Freeman devised and led a new Wintergreen Music Online Community, created a choral ideo project for VCU Choirs called *Adaptation 2020*, and programmed a full 20-21 season of virtual programming for the Richmond Symphony Chorus. Freeman holds degrees from Northwestern University, Boston University, and Peabody Conservatory.





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RICHMOND BALLET | ARTISTS-IN-RESIDENCE



Sarah Lane was born in San Francisco, California and began her dance training in Memphis, Tennessee under the direction

of Pat Gillispie at the Memphis Classical Ballet. When her family moved to Rochester, New York, she continued instruction with Timothy Draper and Jamey Leverett at the Draper Center for Dance Education. When Lane was 16, she received a full scholarship to the Boston Ballet's Summer Program. In 2000 and 2001, she was awarded first place and the Capezio Class Excellence Award at the North American Ballet Festival. In 2002, Lane was a National YoungArts Foundation Winner in Dance/ Ballet, and through YoungArts became a 2002 U.S. Presidential Scholar in the Arts. Lane was the Silver Medalist, the highest medal in the Junior Division, at the Jackson International Ballet Competition (2002). During the competition, she traveled to Washington, D.C. to perform at the Kennedy Center as a Presidential Scholar in the Arts. That same year, Lane also won the Bronze Medal at the

Youth America Grand Prix Competition. Lane joined American Ballet Theatre's studio company in 2002, joined the main company as an apprentice in August 2003, became a member of the Company's corps de ballet in April 2004 and was appointed a Soloist in July 2007 and Principal Dancer in 2017. Her roles with the Company include Manon in Manon. Giselle and the peasant pas de deux in Giselle, Odette/Odile, Pas de Trois and Four Cygnets in Swan Lake, Nikiya and a Shades soloist in La Bayadère, Galya in The Bright Stream, the Fairy Spring in Frederick Ashton's Cinderella, Blossom in James Kudelka's Cinderella, Swanilda in Coppélia, Gulnare in Le Corsaire, Kitri, Amour and a flower girl in Don Quixote, Anne in Christopher Wheeldon's VIII, the Flames of Paris pas de deux, Other Dances, the Two of Diamonds in Jeu de Cartes, Vera in A Month in the Country, Clara in Alexei Ratmansky's The Nutcracker, Olga in Onegin, the Youngest Sister in Pillar of Fire, one of Juliet's friends in Romeo and Juliet, Celestial in Shadowplay, Princess Aurora, Princess Florine, the Fairy of Charity and the Fairy of Joy in

The Sleeping Beauty, the pas de deux from Stars and Stripes, the Waltz in Les Sylphides, a Goat in Sylvia, the Principal in Theme and Variations, Spectre de la Rose and roles in Bach Partita, Birthday Offering, The Brahms-Haydn Variations, Chamber Symphony, Désir, Drink To Me Only With Thine Eyes, Glow-Stop, In the Upper Room, Kaleidoscope, The Leaves Are Fading, Raymonda Divertissements, Seven Sonatas, Souvenir d'un lieu Cher, Sinatra Suite, Some Assembly Required, Principal in Symphony in C, With A Chance of Rain, etc. She created the Chinese Dance in Alexei Ratmansky's The Nutcracker, Miranda in *The Tempest*, Princess Praline in Whipped Cream, Columbine in Harlequinade, Spring Rose in Seasons and a role in Demis Volpi's Private Light. Lane was a recipient of the Princess Grace Award in 2007 and Leonore Annenberg Fellowship in the Arts in 2008. She was the dancing double for Natalie Portman in Fox Searchlight Pictures' feature film Black Swan. She has modeled for numerous companies. Lane is an international guest ballet teacher. She has taught for Kansas City Ballet School, the ABT William J. Gillispie School, LakeCities Ballet

Theatre, Colorado Ballet Academy, Skidmore College, Santa Fe College, and Barcelona Ballet to name a few. Lane is a certified Gyrokinesis instructor. She was one of the founders of Ballet Mentor and a mentor in the company. Lane has written essays for the Wall Street Journal Online, Dance magazine, Pointe magazine, and Dance Spirit magazine. She has been featured by numerous magazines and newspapers, including Glamour, Elle, Pulp, Interview, Timeout, Dance and Pointe magazines. She is an alumna of the Harvard Crossover into Business Program. Lane is currently pursuing her Bachelor of Fine Arts degree.

where he won two scholarships to study with the Compañia Nacional de Danza 2 and the Nederlands Dans Theater II. In December of that year, he won first prize in the Junior Category at tha Zaragoza International Dance Contest, In the summers of 2001 and 2002, Ribagorda was chosen to appear in the Europa Dance Project where he performed roles in George Balanchine's Allegro Brillante, William Forsythe's New Sleep, Nacho Duato's Na Floresta, John Neumeier's Petrouchka Variations, as well as Michel Fokine's Petrouchka. Jiří Kylián's Songs of a Wayfarer, and Marius Petipa's Raymonda and Don Quixote. In November 2002, he took part in the Roseta Mauri International Dance Competition in Reus, Spain, winning a scholarship to The Royal Ballet School. Ribagorda joined Boston Ballet in 2003 as a member of the corps de ballet. His repertory with the company included soloist roles in Don Quixote, Stars and Stripes, The Nutcracker, Drink to Me Only With Thine Eyes, and Swan Lake. Ribagorda joined American Ballet Theatre as a member of the corps de ballet in August 2004. His repertory with

the Company includes the Tractor Driver in *The Bright Stream*, Lead Mazurka/Czardas in Coppélia, Birbanto in Le Corsaire, the Lead Gypsy and Sancho Panza in Don Quixote, Wilfred in Giselle, the Spanish Dance and the Russian Dance in Alexei Ratmansky's The Nutcracker, Benvolio in Romeo and Juliet, a Fairy Knight in The Sleeping Beauty, the Italian Prince in Ratmansky's The Sleeping Beauty, the Neapolitan Dance in Swan Lake, Pluto in Sylvia, Don Zucchero in Whipped Cream and roles in Amazed in Burning Dreams, Bach Partita, Baker's Dozen, Black Tuesday, Deuce Coupe, Duets, Everything Doesn't Happen at Once, From Here On Out, Private Light, Sinfonietta and A Time There Was. He created the role of the Recruit in Ratmansky's The Nutcracker and a featured role in *Dumbarton*. Ribagorda will graduate in April, 2021 with his Bachelor of Science in Digital Cinematography.

Val Caniparoli's (Choreographer, Stolen Moments) versatility has made him one of the most sought after American choreographers internationally. Although San Francisco Ballet has been his artistic home for more than 46 years, he has also contributed to the repertories of more than 50 companies, including, Finnish National Ballet, Hong Kong Ballet, Royal New Zealand Ballet, Joffrey Ballet, Boston Ballet, Scottish Ballet, Pacific Northwest Ballet, Northern Ballet Theatre, Pennsylvania Ballet, Royal Winnipeg Ballet, Ballet West (resident choreographer 1993-97), Washington Ballet, Israel Ballet, Smuin Ballet, Cincinnati Ballet, Singapore Dance Theatre, Atlanta Ballet, State Theatre Ballet of South Africa, Louisville Ballet, Milwaukee Ballet, Richmond Ballet and Tulsa Ballet (resident choreographer 2001-06). Marius Petipa (1818-1910) (Choreographer, The Sleeping Beauty) is known as "the father of classical ballet," and as one of the greatest ballet choreographers of all time. Petipa's full-length ballets, such as The Nutcracker, The Sleeping Beauty, Swan Lake, Giselle, and Don Quixote, form the basis of the classical ballet canon. As a young man, the native Frenchman joined Théâtre Nantes and studied with Auguste Vestris before arriving in St. Petersburg, Russia in May of 1847. Shortly thereafter, he made his debut as principal dancer and ballet master of the Mariinsky (Imperial) Theatre.

By 1869, Petipa the distinguished theatre, elevating was named Chief Choreographer of Russian ballet onto the world stage. As Chief Choreographer, Petipa worked closely with composers (particularly with Peter Tchaikovsky, who was a frequent collaborator) and designers to create original works such as *The Sleeping Beauty* and *Swan Lake*, while also restaging pre-existing works, such as Jean Coralli and Jules Perrot's *Giselle* and Arthur Saint-Léon's *Coppélia*. Petipa died in St. Petersburg, in 1910.

MK Stewart (Lighting Designer, Stolen Moments) has designed for many choreographers who have created for Richmond Ballet such as Ma Cong, Val Caniparoli, Malcolm Burn, Colin Connor, Jessica Lang, Darrell Moultrie, Philip Neal, Gina Patterson, William Soleau, Mauricio Wainrot, Stoner Winslett, and Edgar Zendejas. Outside Richmond Ballet, he has stage managed the Martha Graham Dance Company, Elisa Monte Dance, Pascal Rioult Dance Theatre, Hartford Ballet, and others. He has also worked on projects for organizations such as Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival, Spoleto USA, Wintergreen Music Festival and

Academy, and the Metropolitan Opera Guild.

Rebecca Baygents Turk (Costume Designer, Stolen Moments)

Rebecca Baygents Turk is a professional costume designer and arts educator with over twenty years of experience, whose art has been featured by premier theatre and ballet companies around the globe. She promotes equity, creativity, and play through her art, workshops, and costume design seminars. She currently works at Denison University as the Visiting Assistant Professor of Costume Design in the Department of Theatre. Outside of the university, Rebecca leads sewing and craft workshops in community and museum settings with participants from 5 to 60+ years of age. Rebecca holds a PhD in Arts Administration. Education and Policy with a specialization in Art Education and an interdisciplinary specialization in the Analysis of Material Culture. Her research interests include trans-disciplinary educational practices, material culture, costuming & performance, and practice as research. 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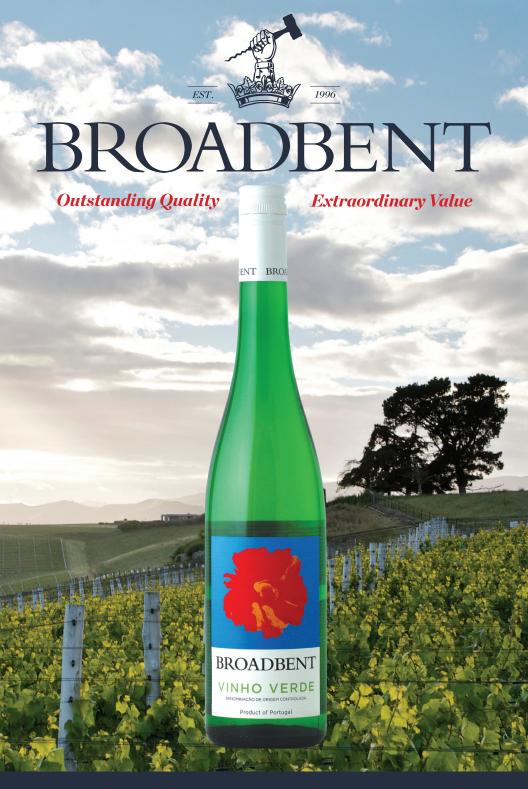
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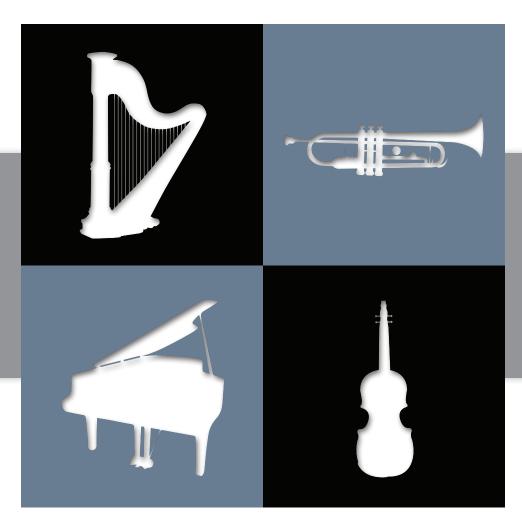

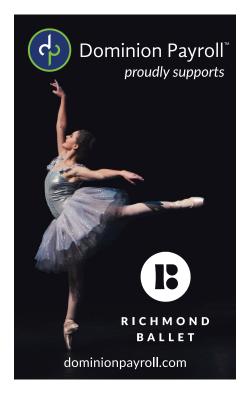




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
