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
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# **OUR MISSION**



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# RICHMOND BALLET | ARTISTIC DIRECTOR



**Stoner Winslett** is the founding Artistic Director of the Richmond Ballet professional company. Her unique, strong partnership with the community has built a fine civic organization into an important national dance force through working toward a clear and shared vision. In the 41 years under Ms. Winslett's direction, Richmond Ballet has established the first major company of professional dancers in the Commonwealth of Virginia, commissioned nearly

75 original works from over 35 choreographers from around the world, introduced the much-acclaimed *Minds In Motion* program into Virginia schools and now Israel, and renovated and occupied its landmark downtown building on Canal Street. She led the Company through its New York debut at The Joyce Theater in 2005, with return productions in 2008, 2010, and most recently in May 2017, and directed its international debut in London in 2012, in a highly acclaimed run at the Royal Opera House's Linbury Theatre. The Company conducted its first tour to China in May of 2015, with performances at the National Centre for the Performing Arts in Beijing and the Shanghai Grand Theatre.

Ms. Winslett received her early training from Ann Brodie, Aldofina Suarez, and Michael Lland in Columbia, South Carolina, and later trained at the American Ballet Theatre School and the North Carolina School of the Arts on scholarship. After knee injuries curtailed her performing career, she pursued a course of independent study at Smith College, where she graduated summa cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa. In 2005, she was awarded the Smith Medal, which is the highest honor the College can confer on an alumna.

Ms. Winslett's vision for the organization has always encompassed not only performing but also the training of artists and the education of the community, which are necessary to both preserve the heritage and explore new directions for the Company. Richmond Ballet reaches over 100,000 people annually across the Commonwealth and beyond, and

boasts an impressive repertory with a foundation of full-length classics and 20th-century masters (George Balanchine, John Butler, Agnes de Mille, Jose Limón, and Anthony Tudor, among others), coupled with a strong commitment to new works, nine of which are are Ms. Winslett's own choreography and include her highly acclaimed version of *The Nutcracker*. The Ballet's scope also includes a school, the School of Richmond Ballet, which opened its dance studios 46 years ago and now serves more than 900 students annually; and many outreach programs featuring the unique *Minds In Motion* program now in its 26th year. The organization operates from a state-of-the-art training and performance center on Canal Street, developed in 2000 under the direction of Ms. Winslett and the Ballet's Board.

Ms. Winslett is one of the longest tenured artistic directors of a major ballet company and one of the few female artistic directors in the United States. She has received countless awards and recognitions at local, state, and national levels, and remains an active leader in the country's performing arts community that includes serving as a former Vice Chair of Dance/USA, as the President of the John Butler Foundation, and a U.S. delegate to the 2014 U.S.-China Consultation on People-to-People Exchange in Beijing. Recognized as a leader in diversity and inclusion in the ballet field, in 2017 Ms. Winslett was part of a small group of artistic directors invited by Dance Theatre of Harlem to begin discussions addressing these issues throughout the field. This two-day exchange of ideas launched The Equity Project, a 3-year cohort led by Dance Theatre of Harlem, International Association of Blacks in Dance, and Dance/USA and funded by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. Although sessions with this alliance of 21 ballet companies including The State Ballet of Virginia concluded January 2020, the promotion of equitable representation throughout the ballet industry remains ever-present at the heart of Richmond Ballet. Despite these many distinctions, Ms. Winslett often states that her highest honor has been the privilege to work with the talented professionals and dedicated community members who have made a real difference in the world by building Richmond Ballet.

# RICHMOND BALLET | ASSOCIATE ARTISTIC DIRECTOR



Ma Cong was named Richmond Ballet's Associate Artistic Director in June 2020. He has been widely recognized by the dance world as a bold, bright, and inspired choreographer. Critics have described his choreography as being powerful and passionate. Having started his dance career at the Beijing Dance Academy, where he trained in the art of Chinese classical dance, he danced with The National Ballet of China from 1995 until 1999,

prior to joining Tulsa Ballet. As a choreographer, Ma was described by The Washington Post as "Powerful" and Houston's En Pointe as having "swiftly risen to become one of America's most exciting choreographers." Ma has created many original works for companies worldwide. His first creation for Richmond Ballet Ershter Vals was performed for sold out audiences at the Royal Opera House in London in 2012 and at The Kennedy Center in 2015. Also in 2015, Ma's creation Lift the Fallen was included in Richmond Ballet's Road to China program for its five-city tour through China. His New York City balletic premiere was in 2017 when Richmond Ballet performed his Lift the Fallen at The Joyce Theater. Among his many personal and professional achievements, Ma was named one of the "25 to Watch" by Dance Magazine in 2006 for his dancing and choreography works as well as The Choo-San Goh award in 2007. In 2008, Ma was the winner of the 21st Century Choreographic competition and also received the "Audience Favourite" and "Editor's Choice Award" from *Pointe Magazine*. In 2013, Ma was named as one of Joffrey Ballet's "Choreographers of Color Award" winners. Ma made his Broadway debut in 2017 while working with Julie Taymor on the revival of David Henry Hwang's Tony Award-winning play M. Butterfly, starring Clive Owen. In 2018 Ma's Glass Figures premiered at The Joyce Theater in New York and received rave reviews from audiences and critics alike. His most recent world premiere, a full-length creation for Tulsa Ballet, Tchaikovsky – The Man Behind the Music, has been celebrated as one of his greatest achievements as an artist and storyteller.

# RICHMOND BALLET | MANAGING DIRECTOR



Brett Bonda, is now in his 36th season with Richmond Ballet, having served the organization as a dancer, administrator, educator, and director. A dancer with the professional company from 1985-1995, Mr. Bonda performed much of the company's repertory, dancing lead roles in ballets such as *Rodeo* and *Coppélia*, and appearing in the premiere of Stoner Winslett's original work, *Ancient Airs and Dances*. After learning of the

outreach work done through Lori Klinger and the National Dance Institute, Mr. Bonda elected to retire from the stage to become the Education and Minds In Motion Director for Richmond Ballet, Mr. Bonda served as the program's artistic and administrative coordinator for 16 years. Additionally, Mr. Bonda has served as the Ballet's Company Manager, Tour Manager, and video producer, before stepping into his current role as Managing Director, where he has worked closely with members of the Ballet's Board to oversee the organization's strategic planning and governance, and to initiate the Road To China project in 2014. Mr. Bonda's work with Richmond Ballet has been recognized both statewide and nationally: he has served as a panelist for the National Endowment for the Arts and as a juror for the Coming Up Taller Awards, and he is a board member for Virginians for the Arts. In 2001, Mr. Bonda received Richmond Magazine's Theresa Pollak Award for Excellence in the Arts and, in the summer of 2014, he represented the United States at the U.S.-China Consultation on People-to-People Exchange in Beijing alongside U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry and Richmond Ballet Artistic Director Stoner Winslett. Mr. Bonda is an alumnus of Virginia Intermont College.

# RICHMOND BALLET | COMPANY ARTISTIC TEAM

Malcolm Burn (Artistic Associate and Ballet Master), a New Zealand native, is in his 34th year with Richmond Ballet. During his 25-year dancing career, he performed in companies such as London Festival Ballet, The Royal New Zealand Ballet, The National Ballet of Zimbabwe, Ballet West, and P.A.C.T. Ballet in South Africa where he won the Ivan Soloman Award for Best Male Dancer in 1973, 1976, and 1980. A Richmond Ballet company dancer from 1987 to 1993, Mr. Burn remains fondly remembered for his principal roles in full-length ballets, for the memorable works created on him, and especially for his riveting portrayal of "Death" in The Green Table. He became a Company ballet master upon retirement from dancing with Richmond Ballet and was named an Artistic Associate in 1999. As ballet master, Mr. Burn has re-staged many of the classic full-length ballets and choreographed his own versions of Romeo & Juliet and Cinderella, as well as other shorter pieces including Pas Glazunov and A Tribute. Prior to coming to Richmond Ballet, Mr. Burn was co-director of Ballet Arizona. He is also currently a répétiteur for The John Butler Foundation

**Judy Jacob (Artistic Associate** and School Director) is from Detroit, where she studied ballet with Evelyn Smith. She trained in London, England, with Anne Heaton, John Field, and Valerie Taylor, and at Butler University (B.A.) and Indiana University (M.S.) with George Verdak, William Glenn, Peggy Dorsey, Anton Dolin, and Kenneth Melville. After graduation, Ms. Jacob danced professionally with Memphis Ballet, performing principal roles such as the Sugar Plum Fairy (The Nutcracker), Swanhilda (Coppélia), and the title role in Cinderella. She also created roles in ballets by choreographers Ron Cunningham, Jill Eathorne Bahr, Norbert Vesak, Robert Kelley, and Philip Jerry. Ms. Jacob was the Associate Artistic Director of Fort Wayne Ballet prior to joining Richmond Ballet in 1995. She was Assistant Ballet Master of the Richmond Ballet professional company for two years and became Director of the School of Richmond Ballet in 1998.

# Jerri Kumery (Ballet Master)

began her studies with Roman Jasinski and Moscelyn Larkin in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and later studied at the School of American Ballet In 1977, she was invited to dance with New York City Ballet under the direction of George Balanchine and Jerome Robbins. Ms. Kumery has served as répétiteur for Ballet Teatro Lírico Nacional and Pacific Northwest Ballet, and from 1990-2007 was Ballet Master/Associate Artistic Director of North Carolina Dance Theatre under the direction of Salvatore Aiello. Ms. Kumery was awarded an Arts & Science Council Fellowship for her meritorious contribution to the artistic community in Charlotte. North Carolina. She is the curator of The Salvatore Aiello Trust and serves as a répétiteur with The George Balanchine Trust.

Igor Antonov (Richmond Ballet II Director and Ballet Master) was born in Zaporozie, Ukraine. Upon graduation from the Kiev Choreographic Institute, he joined the Donetsk Ballet (Ukraine) as a soloist. In 1990, he was invited to join Richmond Ballet, where for five seasons he danced leading roles in works by George Balanchine, John Butler, Antony Tudor, William Soleau, Malcolm Burn, and Stoner Winslett. During that time, he was also a medalist and best couple award winner at the International Ballet Competition in Jackson, Mississippi. For the next several

years, he danced with Deutsche Oper am Rhein in Dusseldorf, Germany, and made guest appearances with major ballet companies in Berlin, Madrid, and Nice. In 2003, he returned to Richmond Ballet, and while continuing to perform with the Company, he began conducting rehearsals and teaching at the School of Richmond Ballet. After his retirement from the stage, Mr. Antonov stepped into the role of leading Richmond Ballet II.

# **Erin Freeman (Resident Conductor)**

serves in multiple capacities throughout the Commonwealth of Virginia and maintains a national presence through Guest Conducting engagements. Freeman holds a joint position as Director of the award-winning Richmond Symphony Chorus and Director of Choral Activities at Virginia Commonwealth University. Additionally, she is the Artistic Director of Wintergreen Music and Resident Conductor of the Richmond Ballet. Guest conducting engagements include the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra, the Neglia Ballet, South Carolina Philharmonic, Savannah Symphony, Charlottesville Symphony Orchestra, Virginia Symphony (continued on next page)

Orchestra, and additional ensembles in Massachusetts, Maryland, Virginia, Georgia, Missouri, North Carolina, and Illinois. In recent seasons, Freeman made her debut at Symphony Hall in Boston with Berkshire Choral International, conducted multiple engagements with the Richmond Symphony and Richmond Ballet, premiered with the Portland (Maine) Symphony, and led an international ensemble of singers and the Orchestre

Symphonique Bel'Arte at La Madeleine in Paris. During the pandemic, Freeman devised and led a new Wintergreen Music Online Community, created a choral ideo project for VCU Choirs called Adaptation 2020, and programmed a full 20-21 season of virtual programming for the Richmond Symphony Chorus. Freeman holds degrees from Northwestern University, Boston University, and Peabody Conservatory.



# RICHMOND BALLET | COMPANY DANCERS



Lauren Archer is originally from Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. After finishing her training at the Ellison Ballet Professional Training

Program, she spent one year in Richmond Ballet II before joining the professional company in 2014. When off the stage, Lauren creates fashion and lifestyle content for Felix & Flora. She has also started a flower business, Monarch Flower Farm, with fellow company dancer, Cody Beaton.



Cody Beaton, of Round Rock, Texas, began her training at the Austin Conservatory of the Arts. She continued on to join

the Colorado Ballet for one season. She has been with Richmond Ballet since 2008 and recently married fellow company dancer Trevor Davis. She enjoys cooking, reading, and spending time with Trevor and their three cats.

Academy for the Arts in Chicago. He has worked with the Joffrey Ballet and the Milwaukee Ballet, where he appeared in works by Val Caniparoli, Twyla Tharp, Michael Pink and Petr Zahradnicelz. This is his ninth season with Richmond Ballet, Matthew participated as a choreographer in Richmond Ballet's New Works Festival for the 2014-2015 season, premiering his work Inventory. Sabrina spent two years dancing in Richmond Ballet II, and this is her seventh season in the professional company.

Ira White, native to Richmond, Virginia, discovered his love for dance through Richmond Ballet's *Minds In Motion* program.



Salvatore Aiello (1944-1995) (Choreographer, The Waiting Room) Artistic Director, Artistic Director **Emeritus and Resident** Choreographer Salvatore Aiello was an American dancer. choreographer, and the Artistic Director of North Carolina Dance Theatre (1985-1995) where he put his unique imprint on the company. Salvatore Aiello's early career as a dancer included the Tri-City Ballet Guild in Boston and dancing in theater productions that include Miss Me, Kate; Guys and Dolls; Oklahoma; and Finian's Rainbow. Aiello's professional career included American Festival Ballet of Rhode Island, Donald McKayle and Company, Joffrey Ballet, a charter member of the Harkness Ballet. The Elglevsky Ballet, Hamburg Ballet under the artistic direction of John Neumeier and Royal Winnipeg Ballet where he also served as Ballet Master and Associate Artistic Director. A rich mixture of training and performances provided Salvatore with versatility in style and theatricality and an impressive ability to choreograph a diverse array of works. The word "energy" most aptly describes Salvatore Aiello and is found prominently in

his choreography. Throughout his repertoire of work, Salvatore captured the essence of the human spirit. In 1996, Salvatore Aiello (posthumous) was awarded the North Carolina Alliance Award for outstanding contribution to Dance. www.salvatoreaiello.org

Douglas Barger (Costume Designer, The Waiting Room) resides in the NoDa area of Charlotte in North Carolina, his native state. With a BFA in Theatrical Design, plus a double MA in Comparative Literature and Art History from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, he began his career in design creating women's apparel for the Salem Company and men's attire for The Hanes Corporation Venture Group. In 1979, Douglas met choreographer, Salvatore Aiello and began an extraordinary collaboration for 16 years designing costumes for nine ballets created by Salvatore Aiello. Doug has also designed costumes for many professional dance companies including the North Carolina Dance Theatre, Ohio Ballet, Memphis Ballet, and Spoleto Festival through his work Salvatore Aiello. He has worked in wardrobe for Broadway

productions including Cats, Phantom of the Opera, Hello Dolly, Present Laughter, Beauty and the Beast, and The Lion King. His film credits include Three in the Attic, Killers Three, Leatherheads, Blood Done Sign My Name, and To Have and To Hold. He has also designed for BBC and PBS. As co-founder of the touring theater company Historically Speaking, Doug directed and designed a series of shows based on 16th-century English music and culture performed for a wide range of audiences. Douglas established an art gallery called BodyCraft that specialized in wearable art. During this time, BodyCraft staged with the American

Crafts Council and the Society of North American Goldsmiths. produced a show called, Pure Gold, featuring the work of 25 of the finest goldsmiths in America. BodyCraft also staged, during this time, among others, and all leather art show called Hell Bent for Leather. that was hailed by Art In America as the first all-leather art show in the Americas, and an adult Valentine show called Be Mine. In addition, Doug has also exhibited his own art at the Southeastern Center for Contemporary Art, The LGBT Community Center of Charlotte, The Evening Muse, A Rogue Art Show, and the uncommon Art Space (continued on next page)

where he also taught a class on Painting Like Pollack. Describing his paintings as "fauve abstract expressionistic", Doug's work is sometimes expressionistic and sometimes impressionistic with intent to capture mood and emotion through the play of light, space and vivid color. douglasbargerart.weebly.com

Ann Beck (Costume Designer, **Djangology**) was born in Ann Arbor, Michigan and received a BA in theatre performance from the University of Michigan and a degree in fashion design from the Fashion Institute of Design and Merchandising in San Francisco. Ms. Beck has designed costumes for many of the world's top figure skaters, including Olympic champions Brian Boitano, Tara Lipinski, and Kristi Yamaguchi, and World Professional Champion Ice Dancers Renee Roco and Gorsha Sur and Liz Punsalan and Jerrod Swallow. She also designs costumes for dance and has worked with a number of choreographers, most notably Helgi Tomasson, Val Caniparoli, and Brenda Way Ms. Beck has also painted and constructed costumes for ballet

companies throughout the country and world, including San Francisco Ballet, Pacific Northwest Ballet, Joffrey Ballet, Atlanta Ballet, and Ballet West. She is perhaps best known in the dance world for her construction of Sandra Woodall's designs for the ballet Lambarena, choreographed by Val Caniparoli, and for her costume designs for Brenda Way's Under the Jaguar Sun, which was nominated for an Isadora Duncan Award. More recently, Ms. Beck has been a Pilates Rehabilitation specialist for 13 years, providing Pilates training for injury recovery, athletic performance, fitness and lifestyle. She owns Ann Beck Pilates in San Francisco and is currently part of the training team for three-time Olympian Shannon Rowbury, a Nike sponsored athlete and one of America's greatest middle distance runners.

Nicholas Beriozoff (1906–1996) (Choreographer, Swan Lake) was born in 1906 in Lithuania. He studied in Czechoslovakia and danced with the Prague Opera Ballet and the Lithuania National Ballet. He joined the Rene Blum Company in Monte Carlo in 1935, was with

Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo in 1938, and became Ballet Master with Marquis de Cuevas' Ballet International in 1944. Later he became Ballet Master of Metropolitan Ballet (England) and of London's Festival Ballet (1951-54), staging Petrouchka, The Nutcracker, Scheherazade, Prince Igor, and his own version of Esmerelda. He became the Director of the Zurich Ballet in 1962, and in 1972 he mounted several Fokine works for the Paris Opera Ballet as a filmed record. In addition to Swan Lake, he also staged Don Quixote for Richmond Ballet.

Val Caniparoli's (Choreographer, *Djangology*) versatility has made him one of the most sought after American choreographers internationally. Although San Francisco Ballet has been his artistic home for more than 46 years, he has also contributed to the repertories of more than 50 companies, including, Finnish National Ballet, Hong Kong Ballet, Royal New Zealand Ballet, Joffrey Ballet, Boston Ballet, Scottish Ballet, Pacific Northwest (continued on next page)

Ballet, Northern Ballet Theatre, Pennsylvania Ballet, Royal Winnipeg Ballet, Ballet West (resident choreographer 1993-97), Washington Ballet, Israel Ballet, Smuin Ballet, Cincinnati Ballet, Singapore Dance Theatre, Atlanta Ballet, State Theatre Ballet of South Africa, Louisville Ballet, Milwaukee Ballet, Richmond Ballet and Tulsa Ballet (resident choreographer 2001-06). Caniparoli has also choreographed for the Chicago Lyric Opera, San Francisco Opera, and the Metropolitan Opera. He has worked extensively with the San Francisco Symphony, most memorably on the Rimsky-Korsakov opera-ballet Mlada,

conducted by Michael Tilson Thomas. Caniparoli has received ten grants for choreography from the National Endowment for the Arts, an artist fellowship from the California Arts Council, three Isadora Duncan Awards for choreography (1987, 1997, 2001) and two awards from the Choo-San Goh and H. Robert Magee Foundation. Lambarena, one of his signature works, was featured on Sesame Street and was nominated in 1997 for the Prix Benois de la Danse for Best Choreography. Previous work with American Conservatory Theater (A.C.T) includes the staging and creation (with Carey Perloff) of Tosca Café and choreography for A Doll's House,



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A Christmas Carol, 'Tis Pity She's a Whore, Arcadia, and A Little Night Music. In 2015, Caniparoli co-choreographed, with Helgi Tomasson, a commercial for the 50th Anniversary Super Bowl with dancers from San Francisco Ballet.

Starrene Foster (Choreographer, Always a Way) A Richmond native, Starrene Foster is a choreographer, dance educator and the Artistic Director of Starr Foster Dance. Starrene has been recognized as 2019 Choreographer of the Year by RVA Dance Awards, Richmond's Most Prestigious 25 Arts Innovators, and is the beneficiary of the 2003 VCU Star Alumni Award, the Theresa Pollak Award for Artistic Excellence, and has been featured on PBS's Virginia Currents. For the last 16 years, SFD has produced the highly acclaimed Mid-Atlantic Choreographers Showcase which provides other dance artists the opportunity to present work. Starrene teaches throughout the country and her choreography has been presented nationally which include: ShortNorthStage (OH), The Philadelphia Fringe Festival (PA), The Jack Guidone Theatre (DC), SUNY Buffalo (NY), The New World School (FL), Old Dominion University (VA), Cornell University

(NY), James Madison University (VA), Dance Charlotte (NC), The Goose Route Dance Festival (WV), the Demetrius Klein Dance Festival (FL), Scranton Cultural Arts Center (PA), Baltimore Theatre Project (MD), The Lorton Workhouse (DC), International Festival of Music, Big River Dance Festival (WV), Scranton Fringe Festival (PA), Stockton University (NJ), and the Festival of Choreography (NC). Starrene is in her 15th year as faculty at the School of Richmond Ballet and is also faculty in the Department of Theatre & Dance at the University of Richmond. She has dedicated her life to collaborating with all types of artists in the quest to make the world richer with art and to make dance accessible and inclusive for all audiences.

Nate McGaha (Lighting Designer, The Waiting Room) has served as the Executive Director of Arts North Carolina, the statewide advocacy organization for the arts, since 2017 where he works for public funding and policy for the arts and arts education. 


